

Executive Summary


Under the leadership of Jackson-Madison County General Hospital a community health needs assessment of Weakley County, Tennessee was conducted. This was completed in fulfillment of the requirements of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Pub.L. No.111-148, 124 Stat. 119, enacted March 23, 2010. The community health needs assessment update process was a blending of Weakley County Health Council top health priorities and implementation strategies, and secondary data on the actual extent of particular health issues.

The mission of the Community Health Needs Assessment is to evaluate and improve the health status and wellbeing of the residents of Weakley County, Tennessee with an emphasis on preventive measures.

The first stage of the Update process involved gathering secondary data from multiple sources including the Tennessee Department of Health, County Health Rankings and Roadmaps, Tennessee Department of Economic & Community Development, Behavioral Health County and Region Services Data Book, NIBRS, TN PRISM, Traumatic Brain Injury Program, and the National Institute of Mental Health. The second step in the Community Health Needs Assessment Update process consisted of reviewing priorities and implementation strategies developed by the Weakley County Health Council.

The Weakley County Health Council identified three priority health issues: Obesity Reduction and Prevention, Tobacco Use Cessation and Prevention, and Substance Misuse Prevention. Several goals, objectives, and implementation strategies were identified to address these health issues that emphasize screenings, education and collaboration with other community agencies with the purpose of easing the burden of health disparity for the Weakley County community.

Introduction

Under the leadership of West Tennessee Healthcare Volunteer Hospital and the Weakley County Health Council, a Community Health Needs Assessment Update of Weakley County, Tennessee was conducted in fulfillment of the requirements of the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Pub.L. No.111-148, 124 Stat. 119, enacted March 23, 2010; and Department of the Treasury Internal Revenue Service 26 CFR Parts 1, 53, and 62 Additional Requirements for Charitable Hospitals; Community Health Needs Assessments for Charitable Hospitals; Requirements of a Section 4959 Excise Tax Return and Time for Filing the Return.

The community health needs assessment update process was a blending of Weakley County Health Council top health priorities and implementation strategies, and secondary data on the actual extent of particular health issues.

West Tennessee Healthcare Volunteer Hospital was acquired by the Jackson-Madison County General Hospital District in 2018 with 100 licensed beds. The Hospital is a member of the American Hospital Association, the Tennessee Hospital Association, and is accredited by The Joint Commission. West Tennessee Healthcare Volunteer Hospital has been approved by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services for participation in Medicare and Medicaid Programs.

The Hospital provides inpatient and outpatient care and a range of specialties including Cardiac Care; Diagnostic Imaging; Emergency Department; Physical Therapy; Sleep Disorder Center; Surgical Services; Wellness Center; Women's Health.

The designated "community" for the needs assessment is Weakley County, Tennessee. Weakley County is located in the rural Northwest Tennessee approximately 137 miles northeast of Memphis and 147 miles northwest of Nashville. The 2017 population is 33,337 and is comprised of 88.9 percent Caucasian, 9 percent African American, and 2.1 percent Other races. According to the Tennessee Department of Economic & Community Development (2018), 19.1

percent of the population is below the Federal poverty level. The personal income per capita is \$33,491. The population under 65 years of age represents 83.1 percent while the over age 65 population is 16.9 percent. The high school graduation rate is 91.8 percent; 27.8 percent have an Associate Degree or higher and 23 percent have a Bachelor Degree or higher.

Weakley County has a wide range of industries that employ individuals living in and around the county. Government, advanced manufacturing and healthcare are the county's key industries. The top employers of Weakley County are UT Martin (1242 employees); MTD Products, Inc., a world leader in the design, manufacture, and sales of outdoor power equipment, off-highway transmissions, and consumer goods (725 employees); Weakley County Board of Education (600 employees); Wal Mart Stores, Inc. (250 employees); City of Martin (150 employees); Weakley County Nursing home (150 employees); Cane Creek Rehabilitation Hospital (115 employees); and Doyle, Sims & Sons Trucking, Inc. (100 employees).

The county seat of Weakley County is Dresden and its largest city is Martin, the home of the University of Tennessee at Martin. The cities of Martin, Sharon, Gleason, Greenfield, and Dresden are located within the county. The public school system has ten schools and serves approximately 4,163 students.

Description of the Community Health Needs Assessment Update Process

The mission of the Community Health Needs Assessment is to evaluate and improve the health status and wellbeing of the residents of Weakley County, Tennessee with an emphasis on preventive measures.

The first stage of the Update process involved gathering secondary data from multiple sources including the Tennessee Department of Health, County Health Rankings and Roadmaps, Tennessee Department of Economic & Community Development, Behavioral Health County and Region Services Data Book, NIBRS, TN PRISM, Traumatic Brain Injury Program, and the National Institute of Mental Health. This data is presented in **Appendix A**.

The second step in the Community Health Needs Assessment Update process consisted of reviewing priorities and implementation strategies developed by the Weakley County Health Council. A Health Council brochure, meeting minutes, and a cross section of implementation program brochures are in **Appendix B**. The final stage consisted of reviewing the two sets of data and final report production.

Weakley County Health Council

The Weakley County Health Council is organized under the auspices of the State of Tennessee Department of Health, and is composed of community members who represent diverse spectrums of Weakley County as well as staff from the local and regional health departments.

The Weakley County Health Council is comprised of representatives from area agencies, faith and community-based organizations; schools; colleges; universities; local government; health care providers; businesses; as well as other individuals who work collectively to improve health outcomes in the count. The council's goals are accomplished through regular meetings, strategic planning, identification of resources, and the work of subcommittees that focus on specific health issues (Health Council brochure, 2018).

The Weakley County Health Council meets on a quarterly basis to develop and implement strategies to address the health priorities of the county. The Council goes through a structured process to select county priorities and adopt strategies to improving health outcomes. Priorities are selected for a period of 2 - 3 years with the last priority selection occurring in 2016. Through this process, the Weakley County Health Council identified three priority health issues:

- 1. Obesity Reduction and Prevention
- 2. Tobacco Use Cessation and Prevention
- 3. Substance Misuse Prevention

Implementation Strategies

Several goals, objectives, and implementation strategies were identified to address the three health issues selected. The strategies emphasize screenings, education and collaboration with other community agencies.

Obesity Reduction and Prevention

The Local Food Network hosts monthly potlucks to provide access to food for areas of the community in need. The LFN is currently gathering data to perform a needs assessment of food access to seniors. Collaboration is forming between local farmers and gardeners to access surplus harvest produce for local food pantries. Several local food pantries will deliver items or store them short term.

Tobacco Use Cessation and Prevention

Tobacco prevention activities have been centered on smoking cessation for pregnant women, reduction of nicotine products in youth, and reduction in second hand smoke exposure in children. Weakly County also received a \$5,000 grant that is being used to create and enhance school policy in both college university campuses and the Weakley County School District.

The University of Tennessee at Martin has adopted their 100% Smoke Free Campus policy as of July 1, 2018. Additionally, exposure to secondhand smoke policies and programs have been implemented with a focus on educating and informing stakeholders and decision makers. The county will continue its efforts with a youth-led initiative called TNSTRONG (Tennessee Stop Tobacco and Revolutionize Our New Generation). The program is a peer-to-peer education and advocacy for prevention of tobacco and nicotine addiction across the state.

Area youth and advisors attended a TNSTRONG conference in 2018. In addition to learning about becoming advocates for tobacco policy and education, they also learned how tobacco impacts the aquatic realm at the Chattanooga Aquarium.

Substance Misuse Prevention

Opioid abuse has been classified as an epidemic in Tennessee. Weakley County Health Council has listed substance misuse as one of its top three priorities and utilizes community partnerships to reduce the number of substance misuse in the county. Several initiatives are underway including the Tennessee Community Faith Based Initiative that connects faith-based communities with a variety of resources and works to reduce the stigma of substance abusers. The Tennessee REDLINE is a toll-free information and referral line coordinated by Tennessee Association of Alcohol, Drug, and other Addiction Services (TAADAS) and is available to anyone who needs help. The Rural Health Association of Tennessee provides webinars including Strategies to Combat Opioid Use in Rural Communities.

The Weakly County Prevention Coalition placed a Drug Drop Box in the Public Safety office for students to drop off any unused prescription medications. UT Martin is the first and only college in Tennessee to have a permanent drop box available.

In addition, Weakley County works with area youth toward the goal of reducing substance use in the county. To this end, the county sent two teams and two advisors to the Tennessee Teen Institute at the University of Tennessee Martin. The Institute exists to promote healthy drug-

free lifestyles and focuses on developing leadership skills and empowerment. Attendees develop action plans to lead prevention initiatives in their schools and communities focusing on alcohol, drugs, violence, and tobacco.

Conclusion

The Weakley County Community Health Needs Assessment was presented to the West Tennessee Healthcare Quality Council on October 2, 2018. The document was approved for submission to the West Tennessee Healthcare Board of Trustees. A presentation was made to the Board of Trustees on October 30, 2018, and the Weakley County Community Health Needs Assessment was approved on this date. The Assessment will be updated in three years as stipulated in the Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act Pub.L. No.111-148, 124 Stat. 119, enacted March 23, 2010.

Tobacc. Jettlement Projects Year 4

In addition to the \$15 million that was appropriated in the 2014 state budget for three years to support tobacco use prevention projects, the Tennessee Legislature granted a one-time appropriation of \$5M for tobacco prevention activities for state's fiscal year 2017-2018. The funds are being spent on efforts centered on three priority areas: smoking cessation for pregnant women, reduction in youth initiation of nicotine-containing products, and reduction in exposure to secondhand smoke by children. As in the previous three years, funds were dispersed to counties for locallevel initiatives.

Weakley County received \$5,000 which will be used to:

- Prevent initiation of tobacco use among youth by establishing and strengthening tobacco-free policies in schools.
- Reduce cigarette smoking among adults by establishing and strengthening tobacco-free policies on
- college/university campuses.

 Educate and inform stakeholders and decision makers on evidence and practice* based policies and programs to reduce exposure to secondhand smoke.

- a. **Tobacco Settlement Update: Weakley County Health Educator, Chelsea White-** Chelsea presented information pertaining to the year 4 funds. Weakley County also sent two teams and two advisors to the Tennessee Teen Institute at the University of Tennessee at Martin in Martin, TN.
- b. **Healthy Campus Update-** Chelsea White- The University of Tennessee at Martin has adopted their 100% Smoke Free Campus policy as of July 1, 2018. Chelsea briefly went over the parameters of the policy with the council. The Weakley County Prevention Coalition placed a Drug Drop Box in the Public Safety office for students to drop off any unused prescription medications. UT Martin is the first and only college in Tennessee to have a permanent drop box available.

IV. New Business

- a. Interagency Council Update, Chelsea White: The Weakley County Interagency Council convened at 8:30am on June 13, 2018, at the C.E. Weldon Library in Martin, TN. Anyone who has not filled out the Weakley County Organization Directory for your business or organization and would like to be listed in the directory, please do so. - b. **Coaching Boys Into Men, Chelsea White:** Chelsea presented an overview of the Coaching Boys Into Men curriculum sharing that the program does not have to be done in a school setting. The curriculum will be taken to coaches at UT Martin in the fall.

V. Announcements:


